The **Certification Letter** does not expire, but some benefits are time-limited.

Find your **Benefits Start Date** in bold and underlined in the middle of your letter.

Keep your letter! You will need your original letter to apply for benefits and services.

With your letter, you can get help with:

Food Money Health Insurance

Medical Services Mental Health Education Employment Housing

Apply for benefits and services

Visit local benefit-issuing agencies

When you go to an office or agency, bring:

- Original Certification Letter (required)
- Social Security ID (required)
 - If you have not received a Social Security number, **visit <u>ssa.gov/locator</u> or call 1-800-772-1213** to find your nearest Social Security Administration (SSA) office.
- Proof of household income for all working household members (required)
- Original passport or birth certificate (recommended)
- If applicable, proof of car ownership, property ownership, child care, recent bank statements, or rental agreement *(recommended)*

Remember:

You may not be eligible to receive all benefits, but you have the right to apply for public benefits regardless of your immigration status. A benefit-issuing agency should accept your HHS Certification Letter. If a benefit-issuing agency has questions about the Certification Letter, they should call the number listed in the letter. You have a right to ask for a supervisor if you feel like your rights are being denied or you are experiencing discrimination. Victims of a severe form of trafficking in persons with a T visa can access public benefits — it will not affect their Adjustment of Status (application for a Green Card).

• <u>Refugee Cash Assistance (RCA)</u>: Time-limited cash assistance for refugees and other special populations who are not eligible for SSI or TANF. **RCA is only*

• Medicaid: Health coverage for people with low income and limited resources.

Health Insurance and Medical Services

- <u>Refugee Medical Assistance (RMA)</u>: Time-limited medical help for refugees and other special populations who are not eligible for Medicaid. **RMA is only available for up to 8 months following your Benefits Start Date.*
- <u>Children's Health Insurance Program (CHIP)</u>: Health insurance for low-income, uninsured children under 18 years old.
- <u>Office of Refugee Resettlement (ORR) Medical Screenings</u>: Health screenings, diagnosis, treatment, and preventative care.



• <u>Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA)</u>: Help with substance use and mental illness.



• <u>Title IV Federal Student Financial Aid (FAFSA)</u>: Grants, loans, and work study to help pay for education.



• Job Corps: Career training program for youth 16 to 24 years old.

CHILDREN & FAMILIES

- <u>Refugee Support Services</u>: Services include English language training, vocational training, and job placement and retention.
- <u>Matching Grant program</u>: Helps refugees and other ORR-eligible populations overcome barriers and find jobs quickly.



- <u>Public Housing Program</u>: Affordable housing for low-income families & individuals.
- <u>Housing Choice Voucher Program</u>: Housing voucher program to help low-income families and individuals pay rent.
